002 The Orphan of Pitigliano (Novel)

This is a multi-layered tale of Jewish survival in Italy in the dark days of WW II. of the hidden treasure in Etruscan tombs, and of the Italian magic known as il malocchio— the evil eye. The story stretches from Italy to Boston over 40 years as young cousins who come to adulthood each believing themselves to be orphans struggle toward the life and loves they were meant to have. We will discuss the historical context of Jewish life in Italy in the late 1930s, specifically in Pitigliano and in the rolling hills of Tuscany. It is here that the land is dotted with 2000-year-old Etruscan tombs filled with coveted artifacts and mystery. We will talk about a superstition held even today by many Italians—the evil eye, thought to be brought on by jealousy, and sometimes cast involuntarily by those carrying il malocchio. Also, we will talk about my own experiences researching this book spending many summers living in and around Pitigliano, coming to know some of the survivors of WW II. It would be helpful to have read the book beforehand, though not necessary. With no mountains, volcanoes, major earthquakes, or deep canyons, Florida's geology may initially strike you as dull. But a closer look reveals geology which is anything but dull. Residents and visitors appreciate the 1,350 miles of oceanfront shoreline, 600 springs ranging from trickles to major contributors to the state's surface water flow, and the great variety of fossils which can be found representing the youngest 50 million years of Florida history. The karst landscape in much of the state, particularly sinkholes, keep things interesting. This class will explore these features in addition to Florida's geological development from an area submerged beneath shallow seas to a peninsula, the state's natural resources (water, rocks and minerals, petroleum), and environmental considerations in a state whose number of residents and visitors has grown at a very rapid rate.



014 Will Our Brain Change with the New Normal?

Approximately eight million tons of plastic enter the ocean every year. That's the weight of nearly 90 aircraft carriers. Unlike some types of waste, plastic doesn't decompose. That means that plastic can stick around indefinitely, wreaking havoc on marine ecosystems. Some plastics float once they enter the ocean, though not all do. As the plastic is tossed around, much of it breaks into tiny pieces, called microplastics. In 1915, Albert Einstein completed his theory of General Relativity, one of the most enduring and transformational theories of all of physics. His theory is based upon a few simple observations and statements. First, motions are relative; second, the speed of light is constant; third, the acceleration you feel in a rocket is equivalent to gravity's acceleration on Earth. While simple, these statements profoundly changed our understanding of the Universe. Space and time are not constants of reality; rather they are relative and intimately connected. Gravity is not a force but the warping of spacetime, which in turn leads to the

prediction of black holes and gravitational waves. In this presentation, we will explore how these simple, yet profound statements lead to these predictions. We will also learn how Einstein's theory of General Relativity has endured more than a century of experiments, making it one of the most successful theories of human history. Professor Jeremiah Murphy is an astrophysicist in the Physics Department at Florida State University. His expertise is in stellar explosions, neutron stars, and black holes.
