

Are you unable to have the vegetable garden that you would like because of limited space or unsuitable ground conditions? Well Straw Bale Gardening might just be the answer to all your problems. Straw Bale Gardening is a breakthrough vegetable gardening method developed by Joel Karsten. Straw Bale Gardening has been used and improved by thousands of gardeners all over the world over the past few years. It is a system of gardening that allows you to extend the growing season in the Spring by about two weeks, raise vegetables in spaces that you were not able to before this. While attending the 1950 World Federalist Conference at Florida Southern College in Lakeland, FL, George and Clifton Lewis of Tallahassee asked Frank Lloyd Wright to design a home for them, saying they "have a lot of children and not much money". He agreed and the couple located a beautiful five-acre parcel in Leon County on the outskirts of Tallahassee, with a natural spring that flowed from the property to Lake Jackson. Mr. Wright completed the plans in 1952, of an unconventional pod-shaped house described as a passive solar "hemicycle" The house was built in just nine months in 1954. Take a guided tour this unique structure which is the only Frank Lloyd Wright designed home in Florida. Most of the fee for this one-of-a-kind tour goes to the restoration of this local treasure.

The Park is home to the remnants of a group of earthen mounds, part of a much larger group built between 400 and 900 CE. These early mounds are architectural remains of Native Americans who worked and lived in the area just south of Lake Miccosukee. You will see Florida's tallest Native American ceremonial mound, built between 1,100 and 1,800 years ago. The mound is 51 feet in height. The people who built the mound are believed to have been members of the Swift Creek Culture, a group of Native Americans who lived in North Florida between 200 and 450 A.D. Did you know that Tallahassee is an *ethnobotanical* hot spot for wild edible and/or medicinal plants and mushrooms? Fall is one of the best times to forage in the Tallahassee area. Join local forager Greg Haberfeld for a Saturday morning walk at the Miccosukee Greenway. Learn how to seek out, identify, and sample edible plants such as grapes, passion fruit, greens, yaupon holly, chanterelle mushrooms, and other local delights. CLOSING LUNCHEON CAMP GORDON JOHNSTON WWII MUSEUM

The **Camp Gordon Johnston WWII Museum**, located in Carrabelle, Florida, was established to honor and preserve the heritage of the men and women who trained at the camp during WWII. Camp Gordon Johnston opened in 1942 for the sole purpose of training Infantry Divisions and their support units in amphibious operations by U. S. Army Engineer Special Brigades [ESB]. This camp trained a quarter of a million men, closing in June of 1946. Three infantry divisions and two special brigades left here after receiving amphibious training to confront tyranny both in Europe and the Pacific. The CGJ Museum has compiled an extensive history of the various units that trained here, as well as a photographic display of the area and life as it existed at the camp. Furthermore, the CGJ veterans have contributed the artifacts brought back from battles overseas, along with uniforms, equipment, and all sorts of souvenirs, too numerous to name. Lisa Keith-Lucas, Archivist, and president of the Board of Directors of the Museum will discuss the history of the camp and share some fascinating artifacts from the museum's extensive collection.

Lisa Keith-Lucas is the Archivist and president of the Board of Directors of the Camp Gordon Johnston WWII Museum. She holds degrees in Chemistry and Geoscience from The University of the South: Sewanee and Mississippi State University. Like so many small museums, the Camp Gordon Johnston Museum relies on volunteers to oversee all aspects of the museum, from managing the collection to the bookkeeping. Lisa moved to Carrabelle in 2012 after a 30-year career teaching chemistry and physics and started as a volunteer board member in 2016. She was charged with orchestrating the move of the museum in 2018 to the new location on Highway 98 across from Carrabelle Beach. She lives in Carrabelle with two dogs (rescues) and her husband Timothy (not a rescue).
